Tips for a great children's book


One of the most important things to keep in mind when writing a children's story is what kids are looking for in a tale. In general, kids want stories that are funny, exciting, and make them feel good.


They also want stories with characters they can relate to and root for.

action

Keep the story moving

Kids love action-packed stories. If your story is slow-moving or doesn't have much happening, chances are your young readers will get bored quickly. To keep things interesting, make sure there's plenty of action taking place. This doesn't necessarily mean that there needs to be a car chase or a fight scene every few pages (although those can certainly be fun!), but there should always be something happening that moves the plot forward.

characters

make them real

One of the most important aspects of any good story is the characters. Your readers need to be able to relate to your characters and feel like they're real people (even if they're animals or talking furniture). To make your characters relatable, give them flaws and weaknesses. No one is perfect, and that includes fictional characters. By making your characters relatable, you'll help your readers empathize with them and root for them as they try to overcome their challenges.

incorporate bright and vivid imagery

repetition

repetition

Repetition is key when writing for children.

Kids love hearing the same phrases or sentences over and over again. This helps them better understand and remember the story. As an author, don't be afraid to use repetition in your book!

have fun

escape the stress of everyday

Writing a children's book should be enjoyable, so make sure to have fun with it! Write about topics and themes that interest you, and let your creativity run wild. Remember, your goal is to entertain your young readers and help them escape into another world for awhile, so don't take yourself too seriously along the way.



humor

giggles and jokes

Another thing that kids love is humor. If you can make them laugh while they're reading, they're more likely to enjoy your story and keep coming back for more. Just be careful not to go too overboard with the jokes; too much humor can actually be off-putting for some readers. A couple of well-placed jokes here and there should be enough to keep things light without being overly silly.



message

teach them

A good kid's book will have an underlying message or moral lesson without being didactic or heavy-handed about it. The message should be something that kids can take away and apply to their own lives.



writing style

age appropriate

The style of writing should be appropriate for the target age group. For example, if you're writing for toddlers, your prose should be simple and straightforward. Older kids, on the other hand, will appreciate more sophisticated language and sentence structure.



The Flow of a Great Children's Story

A great children's story has a flow that keeps the reader engaged from beginning to end. Here is how you can achieve it in your own writing.

Beginning

The flow of a great children's story can be divided into three parts: the beginning, the middle, and the end. The beginning of a children's story should introduce the characters and setting, as well as establish the problem that the story will center around. This is where the author grabs the reader's attention and sets up the conflict that will need to be resolved by the end of the tale.

Middle

The middle of a children's story is where the majority of the action takes place. This is where the characters face challenges and overcome obstacles on their way to resolving the central conflict. Along the way, they usually undergo some sort of character development as well.

End

The end of a children's story is where everything is wrapped up. The conflict is resolved, and the reader is left with a sense of satisfaction. The ending should also tie up any loose ends and provide closure for the reader.



The Top 5 Types of Stories Kids Love


Write something you know they'll love
